



COMMUNITY ASSOCIATION (HOA)— President Larry Velte

The Community Association exists to own and manage approximately 44 acres of land on which RICHMARR, the builders of KPW, could not build houses. The largest parcels are the area west of Roberts Rd. and south of Commonwealth Blvd., and the area south and east of Tapestry Drive, which includes the strip running east from the old Kings West Swim Club across Catterick Ct. through which runs the Colonial Pipeline There are smaller patches

elsewhere. A map of this land is posted on the HOA website, <u>www.kpwhoa.org</u>. The land is owned in common by the 580 members of the Community Association, and it is to protect the owners from any liability that the HOA has the insurance in the first place. What can the Community

Association actually do with this land, or, more to the point, what can we not do with it? First, we cannot simply sell it. The HOA's governing documents (covenants) permit us to transfer the land to a public agency or utility only, and only if two-thirds of the 580 members signed a document agreeing to the transfer. In 2004, the HOA

approached Fairfax County Parks about acquiring some of the land, without success. Even if we were able to transfer any of the land, the liability insurance premium would not

change as HOA premiums are based on the number of homes in the association and not on the size or nature of the common land. We would have to get rid of all of it in order for the HOA to go out of business. Second, we cannot simply post no trespassing signs and keep everybody off in order to eliminate the HOA's legal liability. Per the covenants, all HOA members in good standing have the right to be on the common land. Third, we cannot "develop" it by creating parks, playgrounds, or other facilities as much of it lies in watershed conservation

zones that are restricted by County, State and Federal regulations. In short, common land "management" consists primarily of annual inspections looking for trees that could fall and damage adjacent homeowners' property, checking for encroachment by adjacent homeowners, looking for

potential hazards such as streambed erosion or exposure/damage to sewer and water lines, and identifying any issues that should be brought to the attention of Colonial Pipeline.

The HOA Board of Directors meets at 7:30 pm on the second Wednesday of each month in the CSS Program Multi-purpose Room at Laurel Ridge Elementary School. All members are welcome to attend. 

Some Native Plant Suggestions

Gardeners new to native landscaping often wonder which plants they should add to their project. The answer depends on many factors including the site's soil composition, drainage, and amount of direct sunlight. This article spotlights a few species worth considering. All of them are native to Fairfax County, readily available from a reputable nursery (not

necessarily a hardware or big box store's garden center), moderately to easily grown, and often overlooked during the plant selection process.

Tree: Chestnut Oak (Quercus prinus)



Figure 1. This fallen chestnut oak leaf (A) bears a resemblance to its namesake. The trunk (B) is covered by intensely textured bark. Notable northern highbush blueberries features include (C) bell flowers and (D) ruby autumn foliage.

Chestnut oaks used to be more abundant than they are today, the loss attributed to habitat destruction. It is a grand shade tree with deeply furrowed, ornate bark. Though unrelated to chestnuts, this oak's leaves resemble its common namesake. This tree needs excellent drainage and is often seen growing along slopes and elevated land.

<u>Shrub:</u> Northern Highbush Blueberry (*Vaccinium corymbosum*)

Many people consider blueberries a mere food item without realizing this bush has year-around attractions. In the spring, cream-colored bell-shaped flowers adorn the branches. The succulent berries mature in the summer, providing food for humans and birds. The autumn foliage blazes in scarlet. Reddish to pinkish branches highlight the winterscape. For best berry production, purchase at least two bushes, either wild types or two or more unique cultivars, and plant them near each other. Other blueberry species to consider include the southern highbush (*V. formosum*) and New Jersey blueberries (*V. caesariense*).




Figure 2. By mid-autumn, little bluestem's 2-3 foot blades (A) take on a maroon and gold coloration as seed tufts begin emerging. With stems reaching 3 feet high, false indigo blossoms (B) will enhance any sunny garden. Foamflowers (C) add charm to woodland plots while helping wildlife. Several cultivars are available with slightly different flowers, leaf shapes, and spreading speeds. Most flower stalks top at 6-14 inches. **Ornamental Grass:** Little Bluestem (*Schizachyrium scoparium*) After discovering this gem, folks will likely forgo those nonnative *Miscanthus* grasses sold everywhere! Sea green blades adorn the little bluestem during the growing season. In autumn, the grass acquires burgundy tones before drying into golden stalks. Keep those husks up throughout winter since small birds love eating the fuzzy seeds.

Forb—Sunny Location: Blue False Indigo (*Baptisia australis*) Deep, purplish-blue flowers are this plant's hallmark feature. Blossoming in mid- to late spring, it provides food for many of the bee species suffering population declines. The flowers develop into pods, which can be left after they open and dry out for fall and winter enrichment. As a legume, false indigo's root nodules contain nitrogen-fixing bacteria, so biologicallyavailable nitrogen is added to the soil. Unlike non-native invasive leguminous vines such as <u>wisteria</u>, <u>crown vetch</u>, and <u>kudzu</u>, false indigo forms well-behaved clumps.

Forb—Shaded Location: Heart-leaved Foamflower (*Tiarella cordifolia*)

Vast native wildflower species carpet Virginia's forest floors, many of which are wonderful spring ephemerals [see *The Spring Edition of What's That Plant* (March 2012) <u>www.grsykes.com/pdf/eco-articles/34_2012-03.pdf</u>]. Foamflowers also bloom in the spring, but keep their striking leaves throughout most of the year. Gardeners might use foamflower as a hardy ornamental specimen or as a groundcover. Even more importantly, beneficial pollinators seek the blossoms for nourishment and other critters shelter under its leaves.

Forb—By Stepping Stones:

Partridgeberry (*Mitchella repens*) and Woodland Stonecrop (*Sedum ternatum*)

Plants around stepping stones need to be both short and tough. Many "stepable" garden center plants are non-natives, such as sedums from the Mediterranean region or Irish-moss (*Sagina subulata*, which is not even a real moss). A native perfect for the job in shaded locations is partridgeberry. The deep, evergreen foliage accents the




Figure 3. White flowers appear in both partridgeberries (A) and woodland stonecrop (B). Partridgeberries always bloom with floral doublets.

walkway while the pretty white flowers provide pollinators with a sip of nectar. The red, edible (though tasteless) berries add interest in the autumn and winter until gobbled up by wildlife. Virginia has three native *Sedum* species and woodland stonecrop is the only one native to Fairfax County. As the name suggests, it thrives along stony terrains like Great Falls and prefers bright light. Woodland stonecrop's star-like white, springtime flowers attract butterflies. This plant is easily propagated by snipping off segments and sticking them into the ground, with the best results in spring. Many plants share the "stonecrop" common name, so be sure to confirm the scientific name before purchasing it.

Many authors, photographers, organizations, and agencies collaborated to produce this highly informative and user-friendly book. It catalogs and discusses more native species, suggests plants for different landscaping conditions, lists non-native invasive species to avoid, and provides a slew of additional resources. *Native Plants for Wildlife Habitat and Conservation Landscaping: Chesapeake Bay Watershed* by Britt E. Slattery et al. (2003) is another hardcopy and downloadable book (www.nps.gov/plants/pubs/chesapeake/). This one has a more extensive native plant list catering towards the broader Mid-Atlantic states. Volunteers Needed For Royal Lake Wildlife Conservation Efforts Prior To Dredging Operations by Tony Vellucci

Royal Lake is scheduled for dredging this year. In all likelihood, the dredging will be a combination of a dry and a wet dredge. The contractor will propose an approach which the Department of Public Works & Environmental Services (DPWES) will accept and approve.

If there is a dry dredge component to the contractor's dredging plan, there are several lessons learned from the dredging of Woodglen Lake last year to be leveraged for Royal Lake. One is the amount of aquatic wildlife that



can be saved with some advance planning, and the need for volunteers and volunteer groups to assist in the wildlife conservation efforts.

The draining of Woodglen Lake last year revealed an incredible fresh water mussel population. While DPWES was able to relocate a good number of fish from Woodglen Lake to Lake Accotink, there was little they could do to relocate the fresh water mussels, and most became a feast for sea gulls and other wildlife. Two factors impacted why more could not be saved. First, no one really knew the extent of the fresh water mussel population because they were not visible until the lake level was drawn down. Second, there was no organized mussel rescue party.

Fresh water mussels are not cute, warm or cuddly, but they do play an incredible and important role in lake ecology – acting as water filtering and purification agents. And for that reason alone, they are worth saving and we should make every attempt to save as many as possible. Given the number of mussels found at Woodglen Lake, and the fact that Royal Lake is about three times larger, a significant volunteer effort will be needed for the Royal Lake Mussel Rescue Party.

At one time, fresh water mussels are believed to have inhabited a number of streams in Fairfax County, however today the only place stream mussels survive is just south of the dam at Lake Accotink. The Friends of Accotink Creek (FACC) and Friends of Lake Accotink Park (FLAP) recently funded a fresh water mussel study to learn more about these amazing organisms that can live to be about 80 years old. The study determined that a primary impact to thriving populations is sediment caused by storm water run-off. The study is posted on the Friends of Accotink Creek website at www.acctonik.org. The Friends of Accotink Creek are determined to save the fresh water stream mussels in Accotink Creek and have routinely sponsored Mussel Rescue Parties after major storms to go into Accotink Creek and return the mussels to the stream bed after they have been deposited high on the stream banks due to high storm water levels.


As DPWES finalizes its plan for lake dredging operations and selects a contractor for the lake dredging contract, Supervisor Cook's office will announce two community meetings sometime within the next few months or so to be given by DPWES Storm Water Planning Division, Watershed Planning & Assessment Branch personnel. The first will address ecological factors related to Royal Lake dredging operations, outlining the current health of Royal Lake and DPWES efforts to save as much wildlife as possible. The second will address the overall project, timeline, and logistical factors related to the dredging operations.

Please plan on attending both meetings and contributing your time to assist the Friends of Royal Lake with the Royal Lake Mussel Rescue Party, and other wildlife conservation efforts.





Bikeshare Coming to Reston and Tysons This Fall

Getting around Reston and Tysons will be a little easier later this year. The Board of Supervisors approved a \$1.7 million plan today to bring the Capital Bikeshare system to Reston and Tysons this fall. This investment will help get cars off the road, boost local economy and contribute to a healthier community.


The bikeshare system allows you to check out a bike and ride short to moderate distances from bikeshare station to bikeshare station. Here's a breakdown of stations and bikes:

- 132 bicycles available in Reston at 15 stations located between the Wiehle-Reston East Metrorail Station and Reston Town Center
- 80 bicycles available in Tysons at 11 stations located east of Route 7, north of Route 123, and south of the Dulles Toll Road

We're working to identify and refine the exact locations for the stations in Reston and Tysons, but we're moving forward with the equipment purchase. The first phase of the system is expected to open in the fall of 2016.

"With the transformation of Reston and Tysons into more urban centers, Fairfax County is investing in infrastructure needed to make it easy to get around." said Board of Supervisors Chairman Sharon Bulova. "More people are living and working in these areas than ever before. "Downtown" areas by definition are not designed to accommodate high volumes of car traffic and parking."

The Board's action comes just one month after the approval of 31 pedestrian and bicycle projects in Herndon and Reston, and it also supports the county's Strategic Plan to Facilitate Economic Success. The economic plan calls for creating dense, mixed use communities with many transportation options, and Capital Bikeshare helps to accomplish this goal. Not only do bikeshares attract the younger "creative class" that fuel an innovation economy, but also they produce tangible economic benefits.
