Mike McCaffrey of Hidden Pond Nature Center Recognized with 2015 Cooperator of the Year Award By Dave Ochs, FCPA

The Northern Virginia Soil and Water Conservation District (NVSWCD) recently recognized Hidden Pond Nature Center Manager Mike McCaffrey as its Diane Hoffman 2015 Cooperator of the Year. In announcing the award, the NVSWCD told McCaffrey, "You have been a stalwart partner for NVSWCD's programs, resources and expertise supporting a myriad of ways for people of all ages to engage in local watershed programs."

The award was presented by the NVSWCD board to McCaffrey on February 23, 2016. It is presented annually to individuals or groups who work in partnership with the District to protect and conserve natural resources in Fairfax County.

"Receiving this award is an honor," McCaffrey said. "I have always enjoyed working with the staff at NVSWCD. People like Diane Hoffman, Andi Cisler, Dan Schwartz, Asad Rouhi, Willie Woode, Lily Whitesell, and former Hidden Pond teen volunteer and current director Laura Grape have made it a fantastic experience"

The NVSWCD cited McCaffrey's work with the Virginia Envirothon program, an international high school competition on environmental knowledge. Hidden Pond Nature Center has hosted a team since the competition began in 1995, and the award announcement notes that HPNC has been "a fearsome opponent in local, state, and international competitions." Hidden Pond won Virginia state Envirothon titles and advanced to the international final competition in two of the past three years.

"The confidence the team has when they enter a room and is maintained when presenting and answering questions is unlike many of their peers," said Ms. Grape, executive director of the NVSWCD. "The team exudes this presence because they are disciplined in their preparation and especially because they have fun. It is plain to see that that their coach encourages this serious and yet playful tone."

Grape was a volunteer at Hidden Pond when McCaffrey started working at the park, and she noted that he has introduced thousands of Fairfax County residents to their local environment and inspired their interests in caring for it. She added, "I am one example of this and thank you sincerely for helping to set my course."

"Working with NVSWCD and with the Envirothon team has been a fun, learning experience," said McCaffrey. "I want to thank their staff and the FCPA for allowing me the opportunity to be able to have done this."

The NVSWCD told McCaffrey, "You are a true ambassador for natural resources in Fairfax County and we thank you for your long-term cooperation and partnership."

"The environment is in good hands as long as people like Mike McCaffrey create and help build the foundation for our future environmentalists," added Todd Brown, the Operations Branch manager of the Park Authority's Resource Management Division.

The NVSWCD award is named in honor of Diane Hoffman, an associate director with NVSWCD and retired NVSWCD district administrator for the legacy of cooperative spirit that she instilled throughout all District programs.



UPDATE: Friends of Royal Lake Fund Raising Efforts A Success — By Friends of Royal Lake

In the Fall edition of The Herald, Friends of Royal Lake (FORL) introduced its effort to raise funds for replacement exercise equipment. FORL is pleased that substantial progress has been made through February.



Luckily, several business and some Braddock District funding provided the depth, as the anticipated breadth of community participation was modest. However, if community members want to have a lasting impact on their park, it isn't too late to contribute (see below for address). As noted, several generous business donors earned the "Platinum" designation on the bronze recognition plague, an exemplar pictured below. There also were several individual and business contributions at the "Bronze" level (\$250). The other key funding component, the Mastenbrook Grant application for matching funds, has been submitted and should be approved. It is important that any remaining contributions be sent immediately so the grant application

can be updated if needed. All donors will be recognized in future editions of The Herald.

With much of the funding now held by the Park Foundation, FORL is working with the Fairfax County Park Authority (FCPA) staff to finalize location, procurement, installation, and schedule issues.

The original equipment, much of it now broken and removed, dates to 1979, when Wells Fargo teamed up with the President's Council on Physical Fitness and others to provide exercise equipment to communities and parks like Royal Lake. In conjunction with installation of the new equipment this summer (2016), an Eagle Scout will remove the remaining items. Removal has to be closely synchronized with installation in order



to comply with the Resource Protection Act which controls modifications within designated areas.



FORL researched and identified a 14 piece equipment layout costing approximately \$30K which includes chin up bars, a parallel bar, pushups bars, and sit-ups stations to name a few, and installation. The equipment can be used by both sexes, different age groups, and supports both the county's Healthy Fairfax and Aging In Place program for seniors. As proposed, the equipment will be dispersed in 5 locations along the trail ranging from Lakepointe, west approaching the boat ramp, and a new location by the basketball/tennis courts. The layout purposefully includes low profile body weight exercise stations, multiple locations and equipment redundancy to accommodate user egress, and dispersal to

support a circuit type exercise program. The equipment manufacturer and type is identical to Katie's Playground. The metal stations will be dark green and/or brown to blend in.

All contributions are tax deductible and will be matched 100% (up to \$20K) by FCPA's Mastenbrook grant program. If you have questions, please email friendsofroyallake@gmail.com. Also, upon completion of this effort, FORL will undertake other projects, so there will plenty of opportunities to improve your community park.



Did you know the KPW Civic Association has a Parks & Lake Committee? This Committee's mission is to help the Fairfax County Park Authority (FCPA) oversee and maintain the parks and trails in KPW, and serve as liaison with local scout groups and KPW schools. It is the Committee's responsibility to be vigilant in monitoring and reporting issues related to the lake, trails, streams, the dam and spillway and any other environmental concerns that may arise. However, currently the "Committee" is only a party of two. It's (past) time for this become a real committee with like-minded folks coming together to identify areas that need a little TLC, work with the FCPA and ensure our parkland remains in great condition for all to enjoy.

The Park Clean-up that took place in September 2015 attracted only 20 people at Royal Lake and Rabbit Branch Park combined. Invasive Species Profile: Periwinkle (Vinca minor)

Native Range: Europe
U.S. Introduction: 1700s
Life Cycle: evergreen perennial

Means of Spreading: rapid vine growth

Commercially Available: yes

Control Method: hand-pull, may use garden knife to loosen soil

near roots; repeatedly mow large plots

Good Alternative Species: wild ginger (Asarum canadense), woodland phlox (Phlox divaricata), prairie phlox (P. pilosa), moss phlox (P. subulata)

Comments:

Fond of the purple spring flowers and dark, evergreen leaves, people imported periwinkle to America during the eighteenth century. Periwinkle proved so hardy and easily grown under many conditions that folks used it on low-maintenance areas, such as grave-yards. Some archeologists even seek living *Vinca* plots when hunting for lost burial ground and homestead sites!

These days, people usually apply periwinkle mono-cultures as unoriginal groundcovers. Without natural predators, parasites, or diseases to manage periwinkle, this vine can get out of control. In a garden setting, periwinkle earned its invasive reputation by spreading quickly and overtaking other low-lying plants. Likewise, *Vinca* effortlessly escapes cultivation when the vines creep out of gardens and cross into natural areas. Invasive Management Area (IMA) volunteers found periwinkle mats that neighbors unfortunately threw upside down onto parkland. Instead of dying and rotting, new periwinkle shoots grew from and flourished throughout this pile! While the volunteers sent that mess to an incinerator, please remember never to dump yard waste into the parks or other public land for any reason. Elsewhere in Royal Lake Park, IMA volunteers already eradicated periwinkle infestations from three long-established plots. Pulling and bagging the weeds is the most effective disposal method. Former periwinkle sites

need monitoring to remove sprouts from root remnants. Periwinkle should never be composted unless it is completely dried and killed first.

Folks wanting an ornamental substitute to this cemetery weed have many options. For shade, consider wild ginger (Asarum canadense, unrelated to the ginger spice). Come spring, look carefully at ground level for its burgundy, ant-pollinated flowers. Wild ginger produces a richly foliated groundcover during the growing season. Many *Phlox* species grace the forest floor with purple or pinkish spring-time flowers. Woodland phlox (P. divaricata) is best suited in shaded or partly sunny locations while hardy moss phlox (*P. subulata*) prefers sunny areas and loves rocky soil. Prairie phlox (*P. pilosa*) likes sun to partial shade; its pink blossoms open in mid-spring. While the above mentioned plants are all Fairfax County natives, creeping phlox (P. stolonifera) is a tough, evergreen vine found in Virginia's mountains. Throughout the year, all of these species get along with other plants to both protect against erosion and provide a beautiful, ecologically healthy landscape. THE GARDEN CORNER

Virginia was settled primarily by a segment of the population called "planters." Planters were people who grew things, farmers and, if you lived in a settlement, gardeners. Even Thomas Jefferson loved to grow a garden. He was one of the first American settlers to grow artichokes in Virginia. In those days people got the seeds for their garden each year from friends and neighbors in a seed and plant swap. Trading plants and seeds can be a lot of fun and watching them germinate and then grow is even more fun and rewarding. The kids can get involved by choosing some seeds to germinate, placing the seeds in a folded damp paper towel and place the entire thing in a sealed plastic baggie. Check the seeds every week to see if they have germinated and are ready to be transplanted into their first grow pot.

In Kings Park West we are limited to the constraints of urban gardening, but in reality urban gardening is not that limiting. An urban gardener can landscape his front and backyard, planting flowers and shrubs to beautify the home. But you can also practice the art of "Edible Landscaping," choosing edible plants for your landscaping or planting edibles among your other landscaping plants. Instead of planting a yard full of beautiful azalea bushes, you could plant a bush cherry, a blueberry or other fruit producing bush. Among those bushes you could make space for a few tomatoes, a pepper plant, or an eggplant. Edible landscaping is suited for the front or back yard. Here is an example of an edible landscape in which tomatoes, peppers, eggplants, artichokes, blackberries, and bush cherries are planted among the azaleas and roses.

Urban gardeners may also choose to build a raised garden or a container garden to house the newest plant members of their family. The walls of a raised garden can be made of anything, such as wood; but landscaping stone are particularly attractive. For the upcoming growing season, this raised garden will contain goji-berry bushes in each end, a couple of artichoke plants if they survive the winter and a row of beets, a row of broccoli raab, and a row of bright-light chards.

There are so many options for an urban gardener; you can plant a garden in containers; you can plant a square foot garden or you can plant a fruit tree like this fuyu persimmon tree.

Whatever you decide to plant, you will enjoy sowing the seeds, planting the little plants, watching your plants grow, enjoying their beauty and eating your own produce. Get the kids involved! Start planning your garden today; and trade seeds and plants with your Kings Park West neighbors.
