Volunteer Spotlight: The Men and Women of Burke Volunteer Fire and Rescue Department

A special shout out to some of the most important volunteers that serve our community. The Men and Women of the Burke Volunteer Fire and Rescue Department (BVFRD) carry on the proud tradition started by those first brave volunteers in 1948. Although the station, the equipment, and the fire and medical technology has changed significantly over those nearly 67 years, the pride and professionalism of the volunteer and career personnel and tireless dedication to the mission of providing the highest quality service to the citizens of the local community remain stronger than ever. To give you an idea, in 2014 units from BVFRD responded to 3,548 incidents, including 2,743 EMS, 562 Fire, and 243 Public Service events.

And as if they don't do enough, it is that special time of year again where Santa makes the rounds in our neighborhood on top of Santa's Trusty fire and rescue sleigh!! Watch live on the station's website as Santa runs his route each night so that you can be guaranteed not to miss him! The Santa Tracker will have a "bread crumb" feature this year that lets you see where he has already been. Santa Tracker will be live starting with the first run on December 1st. On weekdays Santa Runs will take place between 6:00 and 9:00 PM, and on weekends between 5:00 and 9:00 PM.

Santa will visit neighborhoods south/southeast and directly east of Laurel Ridge Elementary School off, or near to, Gainesborough Dr. and up to Wycliff Lane on December 10th. Santa will visit neighborhoods and streets between Pommeroy Dr, Commonwealth Blvd. and Guinea Rd. will take place on December 17th. The BVFRD website has dates for additional sections of the neighborhood.

If Santa is unable to visit due to weather or other circumstances, makeup days will be announced. If makeup dates are used the affected boxes and neighborhoods will be listed on the BVFRD website and social media.

UPDATE: Friends of Royal Lake Meet With FCPA Staff To Plan Exercise Equipment for Royal Lake by Friends of Royal Lake

Substantial progress was made 22 October when Friends of Royal Lake (FORL) met with Fairfax County Park Authority (FCPA) staff to discuss their Adult Fitness Study. Further, questions surrounding compliance with the Chesapeake Bay Act and the Americans With Disabilities Act were addressed. FORL is now updating equipment selection, location, schedules, and cost estimates.



The original equipment, much of it now broken and removed, dates to 1979, when Wells Fargo teamed up with the President's Council on Physical Fitness and others to provide exercise equipment to communities and parks like Royal Lake.

However, the Park Authority was never funded to maintain the equipment nor does it have general obligation funds to replace the outdoor fitness stations. Consequently, funding requirements will need to be filled by voluntary contributions.

FORL has identified an 12 piece equipment layout costing \$21K - \$24K which includes chin up bars, a parallel bar, pushups bars, and sit-ups stations to name a

few (includes installation). The equipment can be used by both sexes, different age groups, and supports both the county's Healthy Fairfax and Aging In Place program for seniors. As proposed, the equipment will be dispersed in four locations along the trail ranging from Lakepointe, west approaching the boat ramp, and a new location by the basketball/tennis courts. The layout purposefully includes low profile body weight exercise stations, multiple locations and equipment redundancy to accommodate user egress, and dispersal to support a circuit type exercise program. The equipment manufacturer and type is identical to Katie's Playground. The metal stations will be dark green and/or brown to blend in.

FORL has already approached several communities surrounding Royal Lake that may have an interest in supporting the effort including: Chatham Towne, Briarwood, Glen Cove Community Assn, Glen Cove Homeowners Assn, Hillsdale Townhomes, Kings Park West, LakePointe Townhomes, New Lakepointe Townhomes, Mayfield Terrace, Rolling Woods Estates, The Reserve at Martins Point, and Village Park.

Several of those communities have stepped forward to provide voluntary contributions including Chatham Towne, Kings Park West, LakePointe Townhomes, and Village Park.

Because many of the above communities have covenants restricting spending funds outside of homeowner association property, FORL now finds it necessary to appeal directly

to those HOA residents for individual contributions. They include: Briarwood, Glen Cove Community Assn, Glen Cove Homeowners Assn, Hillsdale Townhomes, New Lakepointe Townhomes, Mayfield Terrace, and The Reserve at Martins Point.

FORL anticipates a contribution campaign through 31 January 2016. At that point, FORL will review funds collected and work with the Park Authority to finalize the equipment list. FORL anticipates the approval of the final list and Mastenbrook Grant application will occur sometime in mid-March, the equipment will be ordered in late March, delivered in late April and installed in May - June.

All contributions are tax deductible and will be matched 100% (up to \$20K) by FCPA's Mastenbrook grant program, so it is essential that FORL raise \$12K in order to receive the matching \$12K.

Royal Lake Dredging Project Ready for Bid

Supervisor Cook is pleased to announce that the long awaited dredging of Royal Lake is now ready to move into the bidding and contract award phase. After working to secure sufficient construction funds and find a location to accept the dredge materials, the County's Stormwater Planning Division and its consultant, Michael Baker, have recently completed a final design for this project which calls for removal of a minimum of 55,000 cubic yards of sediment from Royal Lake. The county hopes to continue its use of the I-95 solid waste complex to receive dredge materials. However, contingency plans have also been prepared to use the county-owned Noman M. Cole, Jr., Pollution Control Plant in the Lorton area of Fairfax County.

The Utilities Design and Construction staff anticipates soliciting bids for this project by December and have bid openings with bid opening in January, 2016. The project will be bid with the option for either a dry or wet mechanical dredge. It is currently expected that a Notice to Proceed will be issued sometime in Spring, 2016.

The county currently expects a total project duration, including site restoration and planting, to be about 12 months. As with other lake dredging projects, there will be a need to relocate existing fish from the lake if the low bid requires lowering the lake. Upon completion the lake will be restocked over a period of 3 years. At this time, there are two construction entrances and staging areas proposed for use by the contractor: Lakeside Park off Pommeroy Drive, and Royal Lake Park off Gainsborough Drive.

This is the last and largest of the Pohick Dams to be dredged; completing a multi-year commitment by Fairfax County to meet current dam standards to protect residents in the flood zones of these lakes and to dredge them to ensure that they prevent phosphorous and nitrates from reaching local streams and the Potomac River as part of the ongoing cleanup of the Chesapeake Bay.

Once the contractor is selected, Supervisor Cook will host a Pardon our Dust meeting so that residents can better understand what to expect and the timetable.

Pohick Stream Valley Deer Harvest Program Status Report

Deer harvest totals from September 12, 2015through November 5, 2015 in the Pohick Stream Valley Cluster reveal 41 deer have been harvested; 87% of the harvest has been does. The breakdown is as follows: Pohick Stream Valley: 13; Burke Station Park: 9; Shannon Station Park: 6; West Springfield Village Park: 3; Crooked Creek Park: 7; Kings Park West Park: 3.

Dr. Katherine Edwards, Wildlife Management Specialist with the Fairfax County Police Department notes that white-tailed deer are on the move as breeding season is here. Drivers may expect to see increased numbers of the deer on and near roadways. Fairfax County crash data indicates that there have been almost 400 reportable deer-vehicle collisions in the past five years. Deer movements and behaviors are unpredictable and deer-vehicle collisions are a serious public safety concern.

According to a September 2015 State Farm report, Virginia has the 10th highest rate in the nation for deer-vehicle collisions. The odds that a Virginia driver will have an insurance claim in 2015 as a result of a deer-vehicle collision is 1 out of 97.

In 2014, contractors picked up over 1,100 deer carcasses on county roadways. This year, almost 900 have been picked up, so far. Approximately one-half or more of all deer-vehicle collisions generally occur during the months of October, November, and December. Deer are especially active pre-dawn to mid-morning and dusk to early evening. These periods of activity correspond with the time when many Fairfax County residents are commuting to and from work or school. Fairfax County Police urge motorists to drive cautiously during this time and be on the lookout for deer crossing roadways. If a deer is injured or killed, immediately report the collision to the Fairfax County Police Department (non-emergency) at 703-691-2131.

These two areas of service are not labor free, but allow ambitious residents to help with home maintenance. Handyman Service has continued to draw requests. So far our volunteers have completed five projects. Residents who have requested services have been pleased. These services are free to any KPW resident. All we require is reimbursement for material costs involved in completion of the project. Since labor is usually the highest cost, that is a great bargain. It is particularly valuable since the service is done by someone you can trust to do a good job. The recent jobs included repairing plumbing leaks, door hardware replacement, caulking, merchandise assembly, and installation of storage shed racks and other hardware.

We remind you to be careful when decorating the outside of your homes for the holidays. It is best if you can find someone to help you, particularly when you are required to be on a ladder. Merry Christmas and Happy Holidays!

Mortgage Interest Rates Likely To Go Up

October's hiring rebound "confirms that the weakness in August and September was just a temporary blip and, given the circumstances, a December interest-rate hike would now appear to be the most likely outcome." Capital Economics chief U.S. economist Paul Ashworth said in a note to clients. Though likely to be a small increase (1 point or less), the result will be an increase in mortgage interest rates. Those of you thinking about a home purchase in the near future would be wise to consider locking in a rate before December, 2015.

8 KPW homes are currently under contract, quite a large number for this time of year. Perhaps savvy buyers are locking their interest rates before the Fed hike predicted for December.

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

NEW WEATHER PROCEDURE NOW IN EFFECT

In response to customer feedback, the Fairfax County Park Authority is changing its procedure for weather-related cancelations and closures. Rather than follow the public schools inclement weather schedule, the Park Authority is now following the county government's operating schedule in cases of inclement weather.

This change recognizes that the unique challenges facing the public schools on inclement weather days are different from those facing the parks in providing recreational activities. Our goal with this change is to provide customers greater access to recreational facilities and classes whenever possible – even on snow days.

Unless the county closes all county facilities, RECenters and other park facilities will remain open for general use and for classes on inclement weather days. If Park Authority facilities are open, scheduled rentals such as swim team practices, meets, weddings and birthday parties will continue as planned unless canceled by the customer or FCPA. For programs at non-Park Authority locations, other guidelines apply.

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COMMUNITY ASSOCIATION (HOA)—President Larry Velte

If you are a member of the Community Association (HOA) and are selling your home, Virginia law requires that you provide the potential purchaser with a HOA "Disclosure Packet" prior to closing. The purpose of the disclosure packet is to fully inform the buyer of the existence of the HOA and the details of its operation. Its extensive contents include copies of the Covenants and Restrictions, the by-laws, the budget and the annual assessment (dues), the HOA's insurance policy information, the association's Reserve Study (funding plan for repair of HOA infrastructure), and information about any pending lawsuits against the HOA or pending special assessments. It also contains a statement of whether any violations of the covenants exist on the property, such as unapproved structures or additions. As part of this process, a member of the Community Association Board of Directors will look at the exterior of the property. Any covenant violations are subject to correction when the property changes hands. If the HOA disclosure packet is not provided to the purchaser by the time of settlement, the purchaser can cancel the contract.

There is no central HOA database for realtors to check. It is therefore <u>your</u> responsibility to inform your realtor that your property is part of the HOA so that the realtor can request the Disclosure Packet. If you are selling your home yourself, you are still required to provide the packet. You could perhaps come up with all the required information, after closely studying Section 55.509 of the Virginia Code. The safer and much easier course of action is to request the packet through <u>www.homewisedocs.com</u>, and the Community Association's management company will assemble the documents. This requires you to establish a passworded account with Homewise. There is a \$225 charge for the packet as set by Virginia law (add \$50 for a "rush" job), and the packet is good for six months. This money does not go to the Community Association, but reimburses those who must assemble the packet.

NOTE: Disclosure packets are required <u>only for properties in the Community Association</u> area of KPW (sections 16-22) and not for all KPW properties. If you are unsure, ask your realtor or contact us at <u>kpwhoa@yahoo.com</u>

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Protecting Pups: New Rules for Dog Tethering Passed

Tethering a dog for more than one cumulative hour during any 24-hour period, unless the dog is under the direct supervision and control of its owner or custodian, is now prohibited in Fairfax County. The Board of Supervisors voted to amend the Fairfax County Code to incorporate the Code of Virginia's cruelty to animals provisions along with the tethering provision. Fines and penalties for violating the tethering provision are as follows:

First violation — Class 3 misdemeanor, punishable by fine of up to \$500.

Second violation (whether or not involving the same dog) within one year of first violation — Class 2 misdemeanor, punishable by fine of up to \$1,000 and/or penalty of up to six months in jail.

All subsequent violations within one year of first violation
— Class 1 misdemeanor, punishable by fine of up to
\$2,500 and/or penalty of up to one year in jail.

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
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KPW Resident Recent Accomplishments

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What a Tree is Worth

Within a home, folks cut utility bills in many ways, such as saving water with low-flow faucet aerators or reducing power consumption by insulating the attic or replacing old windows with energy-efficient ones. However, many people overlook an outdoor money-saving resource: trees! Over the years, trees can reward landowners with hundreds to thousands of dollars worth of perks if planted in the right spots. Tree benefits include cooling shade during summer, buffering winds in winter, stabilizing soil, improving air quality, and absorbing carbon dioxide. You can easily calculate the dollars and cents behind a tree's value through i-Tree. After following several simple steps, the output shows how much money any given tree will save or cost you over a specified time.

Begin by measuring the diameters (or circumferences) of all trees on the property. For the purposes here, a "tree" is a woody plant with at least a one inch diameter at its base and potentially grows to at least 20 feet; flowering dogwoods and redbuds are some of the smallest species. For birches and other multi-trunked trees, take all of the trunks' diameters, square them, sum the squares, calculate the square root of that sum, and use that number for that specimen's diameter. While measuring the diameters, jot down the type of tree and its overall health. If you cannot determine the species, then note generic features, like if it is an evergreen "pine" or "Tree, Unknown" for a deciduous specimen.

Next, go to the i-Tree website, http://www.itreetools.org/design.php. Enter the property's address and click "Go!" Once a Google Maps image of the house and yard appears, follow the website's instructions to delineate the building's area. Now, click on Step 2 to add trees. Notice how many of the property's trees are visible (at least somewhat) on this map. Before inserting trees, consider taking a screen capture of the current image because once a tree is added, a green and yellow grid appears across the ground that prevents seeing other trees' locations. Referring to the trees seen in the earlier screen capture might come in handy as each tree's relative location gets entered. In describing the tree, include the species' common name, diameter or circumference, overall

health, and sunlight exposure.




Figure 1. This image from i-Tree displays the trees' expected crown growth. To respect privacy, the depicted building and trees are fictional, located on Royal Lake's spillway. Trees A and B are both white pines, though A offers more cost savings than the one south of the hypothetical structure. Even with the handful of oaks, hickories, and other trees here, the total money saved this year is \$310 and projected to be \$652 in 20 years, accruing nearly \$10,000 of tax-free savings during this time.

After inputting all tree data, clicking the "Model Crown Growth" button shows the trees' projected growth over the next 50 years. To compute the estimated cost savings over the years, click on Step 3's "Estimate Benefits" bar, enter the number of years to cover (2-99), and click the "Calculate >>" button. A new window appears containing data tabs including the current year's benefits and the money saved over the previously selected timespan. The data can be broken down into the direct impact each individual tree has on the property and itemize the stormwater retained, electricity and heating fuel saved, air pollutants filtered, and carbon dioxide sequestered. Some items, such as stormwater benefits, remain the same regardless of where the tree is on the property. However, a tree's species and placement relative to the house plays a huge impact on energy savings. For example, Figure 1 shows a screen capture of a hypothetical property. Both

trees A and B are identical white pines. However, A saves \$65 for the current year and B comes in at a -\$26 loss even though they are the same distance from the house. This difference is because pine A is north of the house and hinders winter winds; pine B affords some summer shade at a savings but that shade costs more by blocking warm sunlight during the winter. An oak or other deciduous tree is a better choice in site B. You might like to use i-Tree when planning future

landscaping renovations.

Although i-Tree is a fantastic tool to virtually assess a property's tree value, it does not consider every aspect. For example, no warnings flash if a closely situated sycamore's root system might damage the house's foundation or if a diseased and leaning tree should be removed. Likewise, no red flags pop up if a willow could possibly clog a nearby sewer line with intrusive roots. If the user plans to chop down trees, i-Tree's stormwater feature displays a decreased monetary savings but will not alert you if removing too many water-absorbing roots might cause erosion or basement flooding during future rains. The longevity of certain short-lived tree species can be inaccurately extended beyond its actual life expectancy. i-Tree neither considers a tree's aesthetic value nor services to wildlife—a big bonus from native trees.

Final notes: the better the tree's health, the greater paybacks it will provide. Every few years, have mature trees thinned professionally by a licensed and insured arborist and not the cheapest guy who comes knocking. Thinning branches help trees survive microbursts, derechos, ice storms, and other extreme weather events. To give woodpeckers and other wildlife food and homes, leave dead trees or a tall stump *provided* they do not pose a safety risk and are away from any structures.

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
