updated on the dredging project, which will be substantially completed next month. The contractor has hauled away 80,000 cubic yards of silt, constructed two islands, and installed new fish habitats throughout the lake. You will be happy to know that the lake will be restocked with fish, anticipated to be next spring. It will be great to see the lake replenished with water over the next few months!

Another initiative that has started is an update to the Master Plan for Royal Lake Park. Essentially, a park master plan provides guidance for the best uses of the park as well as the optimal management of the park's resources. Since the master plan for Royal Lake Park and Lakeside Park date back to 1973 and 1968, it is time for an update. Topics for consideration are:

- Consolidation of Parks There are currently four different parks to consider: Royal Lake Park, Lakeside Park, Kings Park West Park and Pohick Stream Valley Park.
- Enhancement of Park Amenities This would include Trails, Invasive Species Management, Playground Equipment, Picnic Areas, Boat/Kayak Rentals, etc.


Neighborhood Watch Update

Royal Lake Dredging Update

Many of us have been watching with great interest the progress of the transformation of Royal Lake from a silted lake to a lake itself. We have been talking with the Department of Public Works and Environmental Services and Fairfax County Park Authority, and we have an update. The good news is that the dredging operation is ahead of schedule, and they anticipate filling the lake starting in mid-March.

The contractor has removed approximately 80,000 cubic yards of sediment from the lakebed. At this point, no more dirt will be removed. The remaining effort will involve completing the in-lake forebay, wetland planting, shore stabilization, creation of fish habitat, and eventually fish stocking. The lake will have a different look in that each end of the lake will have little islands (forebay berms) that will be used to help capture future sediment. It is hoped that future dredging will take place in a small area, and the lake will not have to be drained for a very long time. The piles of rock and trees located in the lake bottom are the fish habitat sites. After the lake is filled with water, the Virginia Game and Inland Fisheries Department will stock the lake with native fish. This will be done in several stages to allow for a fully functional lake. The Game and Inland Fisheries Department requests that we do not try to stock the lake ourselves. The rationale is that they have a program that puts in native Virginia fish and avoids invasive species of fish.

We would like to thank the Park Authority and Public Works for enabling us to keep our park almost fully functioning during the dredging operation. And thanks to everyone in the community for their patience during the dredging operation, and for putting up with the dirt and noise. A beautiful lake will be a nice reward.

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Invasive Species Profile: Chinese Privet (*Ligustrum sinense*)

Native Range: China, Taiwan, and Vietnam U.S. Introduction: 1852 Life Cycle: Perennial shrub Means of Spreading: Berries, eaten by birds which pass the seeds; some suckering Commercially Available: Yes Control Method: Hand-pull seedlings and saplings. Mature bushes may require mechanical tools, such as a Weed Wrench. Cut down large shrubs leaving two feet of defoliated branches; continue manually removing new growth until the plant dies (takes approximately two years).

<u>Good Alternative Species</u>: Varies, see below for suggestions

Comments: The previous Invasive Species

Profile article spotlighted <u>autumn olive</u> and its relatives, which are unrelated to the familiar European olives (*Olea europaea*). This article focuses on Chinese privet (*Ligustrum sinense*), a true member of the olive family. Around 50 species of *Ligustrum* exist; most of them are from Asia and Europe. None of them are native to the United States, including *L. ovalifolium*, whose common name is California privet. The name "privet" derives from the word "privacy," since rows of these bushes are planted as screens.

Chinese privet was brought to North America in 1852 and appears either with solid green leaves or in a variegated form, "Variegatum." This shrub resembles small trees when it reaches over 20 feet tall. Most often used as a verdant wall, Chinese privet grows extremely fast, necessitating frequent pruning compared to other hedge species. Given that this semi-evergreen shrub tends to drop and regrow its leaves several times during the year, it makes an unreliable screen. In winter, Chinese privet can hold its leaves, and other times, loses all but a few, though a purple hue might infuse the retained foliage. Overall, Chinese privet often looks sickly even with high maintenance; without care, they show themselves to be the raggedy weeds that they are. The hedge surrounding the Lakeside Park parking lot contains examples of Chinese privet.

The leaves and other parts contain glycosides, rendering them poisonous to native wildlife. Some people try to extract medicine from privet, but be safe and do not risk attempting it. The fruits, which ripen in autumn and stay through winter, look like dark, blue-gray mini-olives, but do not consume them since they are toxic to people! Some bird species tolerate eating the berries and disperse the seeds. These privets also vegetatively reproduce via suckering. Between the toxins and rapid propagation, Chinese privet swiftly invades local forests and fields without sufficient natural controls.

Folks wanting a native alternative to privets have oodles of choices! For a privacy screen, consider a native hedge with species like smooth witherod (*Viburnum nudum*), arrowwood viburnum (*V. dentatum*), blackhaw viburnum (*V. prunifolium*), smooth alder (*Alnus serrulata* — best in moist soil), white fringetree (*Chionanthus virginicus*), spicebush (*Lindera benzoin*), and winterberry (*Ilex verticillata*). Mixing different shrubs into the screen adds both aesthetic beauty and resiliency in case a blight or other factors prevent one species from surviving there. Silky dogwood (*Cornus amomum*) and red osier dogwood (*C. sericea*) make successful

hedges, too, though sawfly larvae can strip the greenery. For dense, evergreen borders, American holly (*Ilex opaca*) does the trick, though it grows slower than the other natives mentioned.

The next edition features wax-leaf or Japanese privet (*L. japonicum*). Until then, here are some additional privet resources to investigate:

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YOU can help decide the future of our parks!

The kick-off meeting for the Royal Lake Master Plan development took place last month and was well attended. The Fairfax County Park Authority has a process by which it plans for development work at all parks called the Planning and Development Annual Work Plan, and the FY18 Work Plan is slated to address the Royal Lake Master Plan. The purpose of a Master Plan is to create a long-range vision for the park by determining the best uses and resource management for each park; it's a 20-year look into the future, and serves as a long-term decision-making tool for *all* County planning, programming or resource management activities. So it's in our interest to make sure the County knows what we think is important! (To see what other Master Plans entail, check out: http://www.fairfaxcounty.gov/parks/plandev/mparchives.htm.)

YOU have a voice and can make a difference in what the parks surrounding Royal Lake will become in the future for generations to come. During the course of 2017, the Friends of Royal Lake (FORL) will be hosting a series of community meetings (roughly every month) to discuss various aspects of our park. We'll have guest speakers and specific discussions on topics including trail improvements, sustainability of the lake itself, possible consolidation and renaming of the various parks that surround Royal Lake (Lakeside Park, Royal Lake Park, Pohick Stream Valley Park, Kings Park West Park), the amenities at the parks, and possible aquatic programs – such as bringing back the rental boats the Park Authority had there in the 1980s. The FORL wants to take the initiative to provide solid, structured community inputs for the Park Authority's consideration. There will be a survey (via Survey Monkey) coming out soon where you can let us know what's on your mind (in a constructive way!).



"Woodchucks". No, these are not rodents.

They are people who solicit work, usually tree trimming services, who overcharge or do not complete the requested task. They generally target older residents living alone. Once hired, they continue to offer a range of other services, such as an insulation upgrade, re-sodding, even remodeling, but then barely or never perform the service. During their soliciting, they often become aggressive.

In *The Washington Post*, Dan Morse's article on February 22nd describes the "devastating" fraud caused by the crew in Maryland. Three Maryland residents were bilked more than \$100,000. Judge Robert Green said, "I can really think of no crime - or very few crimes - that rise to the level of what occurred to these three people in this case." Detective Kevin White said that many "woodchucks" pass their trade on to their kids. These crimes also damage the reputation of companies who do legitimate business in our community.

The article cites police estimates of more than 100 in Maryland. Unfortunately, we have the same issues in Virginia.

So what can we do? First, if you choose to have tree service performed by solicitors, ask to see their liability insurance and do not pay them until their job is complete. Also, do not hire them to provide other services.

Secondly, if you live near a KPW older resident and see pickup trucks repeatedly stopping nearby, start asking questions about whether any work is being done. If you suspect "woodchucks", call West Springfield Police District and report it (703-691-2131). Watching out for and helping neighbors is a trait that attracts many to our KPW community.

Road Raiders Are Friends of Royal Lake

It's interesting how sometimes the activities of one group can positively impact the activities of another in a community. The objective of KPW Road Raiders is to make Kings Park West more attractive by cleaning up some of the common areas that many of us drive by each day, and which are the responsibility of other organizations such as VDOT and the Park Authority.

By keeping our streets clean, Road Raiders are helping to keep our parks surrounding Royal Lake clean as well.

Royal Lake is an incredible natural resource, and the parks surrounding the lake provide a host of amenities to our residents, such as trails, basketball and tennis courts, playgrounds and outdoor fitness equipment.
