Recommended By-Law Amendment

Frequency of Membership Meetings: The Board requests the membership to consider reducing the number of membership meetings from thrice annually to twice. This change requires amending our By-Laws. The Board is confident that the business of the Association can effectively be presented to the membership twice a year. Also, the By-Laws will continue to stipulate that additional meetings of members shall be held at the request of the President or the Board of Directors, or upon the written request of at least twenty-five (25) members in good standing.

The following amendment to the By-Laws will be presented for approval at the May 2nd membership meeting:

ARTICLE VI – MEETINGS OF MEMBERS

<u>Section 1 – Scheduling and Location</u>

1. Meetings of members shall be held in or about each September, January, and April on dates selected by the Board of Directors. The September meeting shall be deemed the Annual Meeting of Members of the Association.

In order to put this amendment to a vote, we will need a quorum of twenty-five (25) members. 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

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No Foolin', KPW has great volunteers...but EVERYONE should pick up the trash!

Saturday, April 1st, saw a three-part harmony of park clean-ups at Rabbit Branch, Royal Lake and Lakeside Parks, with nearly thirty people helping protect our environment. THANK YOU to those who came out! It was a fun morning getting together with neighbors, enjoying the spring weather, and doing some good for our community. Next year, we will try to pick a date that has fewer conflicts with other community events.

Some folks seem to think that all of those beverage containers, straws, plastic bags, bottles, cans, and other items of trash (gas grills, construction materials, steering wheel covers?) simply wash away into the storm drains and magically disappear. This picture shows too clearly what negligence looks like! Trash accumulates in the parks, pollutes our local streams, and winds up in our very own Royal Lake. But it doesn't stop there! KPW is at the headwaters of a Potomac River tributary, and we can trace Royal Lake to Pohick Creek to Pohick Bay to Gunston Cove to the Potomac River to the Chesapeake Bay to the Atlantic Ocean – and some of our local trash can end up on the massive trash vortexes in the ocean.

I've heard from some folks that they carry bags with them on their walks through the neighborhood and around the lake, and that's awesome! There's no need to wait for the Spring or Fall Park Cleanups to help out. Encourage others to pick up trash whenever they find it – in the park, in the street – it doesn't matter. It also doesn't matter if someone tossed the trash deliberately or sanitation workers accidently spilled some while collecting garbage or recyclables – trash is trash and has an impact. Let's see if our deliberate actions can have a *bigger* impact in the coming months and years!









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THE GARDEN CORNER

The urban gardener is faced with a number of challenges associated with the fact that growing a garden in an urban environment is a bit more complicated than in a rural setting. In Kings Park West, some of those challenges are: 1) sunlight – shade created by houses and trees limits the areas where sun-loving plants can be grown; 2) space – most of our lots in Kings Park West are not extremely large, and therefore, finding space for the plants you want to grow can be difficult.

One solution to these problems is the use of a technique called "edible landscaping." Landscaping with *edible* plants can give you more room to plant vegetables, and can also be very attractive landscaping. Edible landscaping, especially when paired with organic gardening practices, enhances the beauty of any yard, garden or landscape. So the use of edible landscaping is a win for the gardener and a win for the landscaper. My preferred method is to plant my vegetables among my flowers and flowering shrubs. If you want your landscape to be attractive and edible, you need to plan.

Decide what flowers, flowering shrubs and vegetables you want to plant. I like to experiment, but essentially, you need to plant your taller plants toward the rear of your landscape bed, so that the taller plants do not rob the sunlight from the shorter plants. For flowers, I tend to let my spouse decide what to plant. She has planted a mix of annuals and perennials, including roses, pinks, zinnias, chrysanthemums, snow bells, day lilies, hydrangea, azaleas, hostas, tulips, gladiolas, and many others. For our vegetables, we like to plant tomatoes, eggplants, peppers, various types of greens, various types of beans, onions, leeks and garlic. We have also planted artichokes with some success.

Speaking of artichokes, it is important to start them indoors and transfer them outdoors around March 1st to allow adequate vernalization in order to promote fruiting. Vernalization is the process of exposing plants to cool temperatures to promote fruiting. When a frost threatens, it is important to cover the transplanted artichokes to prevent damage.

We also like to plant fruits. We have planted blueberries, blackberries, bush cherries and strawberries. In selected areas, we have planted fig trees. For fig trees in the Kings Park West area, you need to select a hardy variety, such as the Chicago Hardy Fig, and plant it near a protected area that gets adequate sun, perhaps near the house. In order to ensure the production of fruit prior to the first frost, it is advisable to use the "six and pinch" method. After a fig shoot produces six or seven leaves, pinch off the end of the shoot. This will promote early production of fruit, and therefore, an early harvest.

My spouse plants her roses, azaleas and hydrangeas toward the fence or the house. She leaves room between these tall flowering bushes for a tomato or an eggplant. We also intersperse pepper plants in the plan where they get plenty of sunlight.

We plant four types of beans: Oriental yard-long beans next to the fence, pole beans, also next to the fence, and two types of bush beans in front of them. Bean plants are a nitrogen fixer which adds nitrogen to your garden soil. In front of the pole beans, or in the front landscape border, we also plant mustard greens, Swiss chards and bright-light chards. These plants allow us to harvest an abundant amount of greens for our table.

In October, we planted a small garlic bed with five varieties of hard-neck garlic. After growing through the fall and winter, the garlic is about 12 inches tall, and will be ready to harvest in July. We also planted a few leeks and some perennial onions, Egyptian walking onions. These onions allow harvesting all year, even during the cold months.

I planted three fuzzy kiwi vines that are intended to cover our pergola and three hardy kiwi vines that run up a "T" trellis system. Finally, we have added a few other fruit trees, a fuyu persimmon, a cherry tree, three peach trees, a jujube, two Asian pears and two pawpaw trees. I will write more about the pawpaw trees in later articles.



Invasive Species Profile: Wax-Leaf Privet (*Ligustrum japonicum*)

Genus Native Range: Japan and Korea

<u>U.S. Introduction</u>: Early 1800s <u>Life Cycle</u>: Perennial shrub

Means of Spreading: Berries, eaten by birds which pass the seeds; some suckering

Commercially Available: Yes

<u>Control Method</u>: Hand-pull seedlings and saplings. Mature bushes may require mechanical tools, such as a Weed Wrench. Cut down large shrubs leaving two feet of defoliated branches; continue manually removing new growth until the plant dies (takes approximately two years).

<u>Good Alternative Species</u>: Members of *Kalmia*, great rhododendron (*Rhododendron maximum*), American holly (*Ilex opaca*)

The previous Eco-Article examined <u>Chinese privet</u> and the problems it causes in Northern Virginia. Keeping with the olive-themed Invasive Species Profiles, this edition sheds light on the wax-leaf privet (*Ligustrum japonicum*). Also called Japanese privet, this ornamental shrub came to America shortly after 1800. The thick, glossy leaves remain evergreen. The deep green foliage densely covers the branches. All privets possess leaf pairs appearing opposite each other along the stem. Wax-leaf privet is used either in hedges or as a solitary specimen. Like Chinese privet, wax-leaf privet blossoms in late spring and produces berries lasting into the fall and winter. However, the fruits and leaves are toxic to people, pets, and most native wildlife, except for some bird species capable of eating the berries. These birds subsequently spread the seeds, thereby helping wax-leaf privet become an unrestrained weed. Native to Japan and Korea, wax-leaf privet lacks adequate biological and climatic controls in the southeastern United States, where it escaped cultivation and invades woodlands, meadows, and other natural areas. Though not as pervasive in Northern Virginia as Chinese privet, Invasive Management Area (IMA) volunteers routinely encounter and remove wax-leaf privet before this weed completely infests Fairfax County parks.

For evergreen alternatives to wax-leaf privet, consider native azalea relatives (not the ubiquitous evergreen Asian hybrids), such as great rhododendron (*Rhododendron maximum*), mountain laurel (*Kalmia latifolia*), or sheep laurel (*K. angustifolia*) integrated into the hedge or as an individual bush.




Figure 1. These images compare Chinese and wax-leaf privets. Their seedlings (A, D) look like miniature versions of the mature plants. Next to not planting any privets at all, identifying and pulling these weeds at this early stage is the second easiest way to stop them from spreading. Both species' sweet smelling flowers bloom in early June (B, E), but the ripened fruits (C, F) cling to the branches during the autumn and winter months.
