meeting to fill the one vacancy. Many thanks to Adrienne, Mary and Jonathan. We also extend our sincere appreciation to Karen Hasselman, who fulfilled the Member-at-Large position. Thank you for your dedicated service on the Board and for chairing the Halloween Festival for the last two years.

In addition, the membership approved the 2018 budget, which was modified based on two motions from the floor. The changes to the budget included an increased budget of \$1,000 for Parks and Lakes Maintenance and the addition of the Summer National Night Out Activity with a budget of \$250.

The Board is currently investigating the replacement of our three community signboards. The signboards are located at: 1) Roberts Road and Commonwealth Boulevard; 2) Guinea Road/Twinbrook Road and Commonwealth Boulevard; and 3) Tapestry Drive and Braddock Road.

The signboards are old, and you may have noticed that a summer storm brought down some large tree branches onto the signboard at the main entryway at Guinea Road. We will be coordinating this effort with the KPW Homeowners Association, who owns the properties where these signboards are located.

As mentioned, the 2018 membership drive is underway. The dedicated block captains, database manager and committee chair are all hard at work. Their efforts with the membership drive allows the Association to move forward with key community activities, such as cleaning up the parks and roadways, providing college scholarships, hosting the Easter Egg Hunt and Halloween Festival, preparing for emergencies, patrolling the neighborhood, and caring for the landscape beds. An amazing array of activities that makes Kings Park West such a great place to live in.


The Pumpkin Patch

Boy Scout Troop 1966

The scouts of Kings Park West **Troop 1966** enjoyed a fantastic week learning and practicing the skills that form the basis for the scouting way of life at the Goshen Scout Reservation over the summer. While at camp, two Troop 1966 scouts (Derek Guidorizzi and David Reddinger) were inducted into the Order of the Arrow, and another Troop 1966 scout (Ben Walker) completed his Brotherhood Walk, signaling his ongoing

commitment to and full membership in the Order.

Congratulations to them for their achievement, and for setting the example for the Troop's younger scouts. The rest of the summer was also very busy, as six of our scouts executed their projects as one of the last steps in their quests for the rank of Eagle Scout. Mason Izadpanah, Drew McGrail, Michael Visosky, Andrew Kanellis, Wilson Friestad, and Arya Johri – keep charging!

More recently, the Troop trekked out to Nokesville for a day trip to Tank Fest, where we could get up close to over one hundred U.S. and foreign tanks and armored/unarmored vehicles, as well as see soldiers dressed in the uniforms of the era, food, hand weapons (rifles, pistols,



knives, grenades, etc.), cavalry, K-9s, and several moving tank demonstrations. The highlight of the day was a live-fire demonstration of a full WWII Marine rifle squad advancing and securing a fixed position after arriving on the scene in a WWII-era LVT-4 Amphibious Personnel Carrier, and taking the position by firing their rifles while advancing, with supporting live fire from a Sherman tank and, finally, securing the position with an actual flamethrower. The boom of the tank was tremendous, and the flamethrower was a spectacular sight. The boys LOVED it, as did the adults!

The Troop is now gearing up for our first campout on October 13-15, where we will be camping on the grounds of President James Madison's home. The boys plan to tour the grounds, participate in archery, air rifle, and dodge ball, cook all of their own meals, and some plan to work on one of the following merit badges (Archaeology, American Heritage, Citizenship in the Nation, Photography, or Space Exploration). It will be an action-packed weekend!







Native Meadows: Part 3

Part 1 of this series introduced native meadows and showed how homeowners can apply the landscaping principles. Part 2 presented some terrific plant species for the new garden and other species to avoid. Now that the native meadow garden is in place, caring for it is easy! After planting, the watering rule of thumb is, "Once a day for a week, once a week for a month, and then once a month for a year." At most, fertilize with a little leaf-based mulch or compost. Meadow plants do not need much nutrients and can actually suffer when overfertilized. Avoid insecticides, since they defeat the purpose of attracting pollinators and maintaining host plants. Allow natural predators to keep pesky bugs in check.

After the flowers complete their blossoming cycle, either leave the seeds as bird food and winter interest or deadhead them to prevent plant propagation. During winter, the husks provide wildlife with shelter. Insects and spiders hibernate in or amongst the stalks, usually as eggs or pupa. Keep the white turtlehead stalks standing for Baltimore checkerspot larvae to overwinter. Alternatively, an autumn mowing thwarts young bushes and trees from developing, though let the clippings fall as a mulch cover. Pulling woody plants as seedlings and small saplings is a better way to preventing them from overtaking a meadow.

In the ensuing years, thin or split the specimens as needed. Many grasses and sedges benefit from a yearly division

conducted in autumn. Clean, sharp shovels or garden knives cut plants neatly while minimizing excessive damage and infection susceptibility. Share the surplus plants and their seeds with your neighbors; doing so is both friendly and introduces others to wonderful native species. *Please* do not give away non-native plants. For example, the frequently shared liriope (*Liriope spicata*) pops up in natural areas with increasing frequency, lacks significant biological controls, and is already on the National Park Service's "Alert" list. The best action is to replace liriope with native alternatives having similar appearance or horticultural function, such as Pennsylvania sedge (*Carex pensylvanica*). Throwing any extra liriope away in the regular trash (not in recyclable yard waste) and sparing others from dealing with this weed is the most neighborly action you can take. Broaden your horizons and enjoy your native meadow!



THE GARDEN CORNER

Planning for the urban gardener in Kings Park West is tied to the seasons. Seasons require many decisions concerning activities that ensure a successful garden. Have you thought about what you may need to do this fall to get your garden ready for the winter?

There are many activities that I recommend, but the list is subject to your ultimate gardening objectives. If you have been an avid composter during the spring and summer, as I have, you will have some compost that is ready to be added to your garden soil. I compost using three methods; I use a plastic compost barrel that I made for the purpose. I used kitchen vegetable and fruit scraps, along with shredded leaves and grass clippings, to make my compost. By the time to composting process was complete, I had about four cubic feet of good compost ready to use. I placed this compost on a portion of my garden about fifty feet square and tilled the compost until it was well-mixed with the soil. Secondly, I also use the dig, dump, and cover method in which I dig a hole in the garden soil and dump my vegetative scraps into it and cover them with soil. I begin this process in the fall and use it until the spring garden is planted. And last, and by far my favorite composting method, is the use of my 360-degree worm farm in which I allow the red-wriggler worms to create worm castings from vegetative kitchen scraps. In the spring, I will harvest the castings and use them to improve my potting soil, and sometimes place a small amount in the hole where I transplant my garden plants. In summary, fall is a great time to improve your garden soil through composting, but if you don't have your own compost, you can purchase it.

The fall is also a great time to gather composting material. As I rake my leaves and pick them up as I mow my grass for the last time, I collect as much as I can in barrels or leaf bags and save them to contribute to my spring compost. If you do not have your own trees from which you can gather leaves, I am sure your neighbors will allow you to use theirs. Just watch the curbs for discarded bags of leaves.

Want to grow garlic in your garden? Mid to late October is a great time to plant garlic in Kings Park West. To plant your garlic, you need to: 1) Prepare your soil – I use a small cultivator to prepare my soil and till in my compost, but you can also use a shovel or similar hand tool; 2) Decide what type of garlic to plant and obtain planting cloves – there are three basic types of garlic, softneck – the variety that is most often available in supermarkets, hardneck – the most savory garlic that can be purchased in many gardening supply stores or online, and elephant garlic – which is not really garlic and makes larger bulbs, but is used in the same way as garlic; and 3) Plant your cloves – I use a broom handle to make holes in my garden soil about six inches deep, four to six inches apart, in rows about twelve inches apart; I then drop the cloves in the hole with the pointed end up and cover them up. You can place a four-inch bed of shredded leaf mulch on top, but it is not necessary. I am planting primarily hardneck garlic of four varieties. I saved cloves from my June harvest including Bavarian White, Korean Mountain, Romanian Red, and Silver Skin. Planting your garlic in the fall will get a jumpstart in the growing process, and it will be ready for harvest in June and July. Your garlic will sprout before the winter freeze, but will not be harmed by the cold weather.

Other chores that you may want to accomplish in the fall could include winterizing your rain barrels. I drain my rain barrels to prevent freeze damage, and remove my rain diverter so that the barrel does not collect rain water during the winter. Also, drain the water from your water hoses and place them in a protected area, like a shed or garage to prevent freeze damage. You should ensure that hoses are not still connected to outside faucets, and that the water running to the faucets is turned off and the faucets are drained. You may also want to prepare your planting containers for the winter by removing the potting soil and storing then in a protected place for the winter to prevent freeze damage. I collect my used potting soil in a barrel for use next spring. In the spring, I will add compost and organic fertilizer to the used potting soil to prepare it for reuse. To prevent soil-borne disease organisms in the soil, use your oven or microwave to neutralize the soil. You can find instructions online. If you have potted plants that you want to protect during the winter, bring them in. Remember, they will need a warm temperature, adequate water, and at least six to eight hours of sunlight.
