Lakeside Park, located at Pommeroy Drive and Bronte Drive, which includes the playground, parking lot, basketball courts and athletic fields, will retain its name. All other park properties surrounding Royal Lake is recommended to be named Royal Lake Park. A show of hands indicated overwhelming support of this idea.

As is typical this time of year, sales and listings in KPW have slowed dramatically. Inventory is low, with just 6 homes for sale; another 3 are under contract. Well-presented homes continue to sell quickly at or near list price while poorly prepared homes are lingering on the market. These homes will most likely close at a lower price than their more carefully prepped counterparts, and can drive down market value overall in the neighborhood!

Federal Reserve Interest Rate Hike: The Federal Reserve raised interest rates Wednesday for the third time this year. "Mortgage rates are unlikely to see any significant impact from this rate hike. It would take a surge in inflation to push mortgage rates meaningfully higher," says Greg McBride, CFA, chief financial analyst for Bankrate.com.

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FRIENDS OF ROYAL LAKE (FORL) COMMUNITY MEETING WEDNESDAY OCTOBER 24TH, 7-8:30 PM LAUREL RIDGE CAFETERIA

The Fairfax County Parks Authority (FCPA) has many parks, many lakes, and many interests, and a Friends Group works with FCPA to support, enhance and advocate for specific parks and lake projects that are most important to OUR community. Our voice is heard more strongly when we come together as a community and we pool our energy and expertise. You may recall the recent FORL effort to develop a new Master Plan for Royal Lake, which morphed into the Community Vision Plan. Thanks to that effort, where **we as a community identified the greatest needs**, we got FCPA support to repair some very steep parts of the trail around Royal Lake (near the Lakeview Swim Club) as a first project. Over the course of the next year, FORL plans to work with the FCPA to identify, categorize, and prioritize the needs of Royal Lake and surrounding parkland. And then, work to getting those requests addressed!

Come make your voice heard at our FORL Community Meeting on October 24th!

What has FORL accomplished, thus far?

- 1) Helped get new exercise equipment installed around the lake
- 2) Coordinated semi-annual park/lake clean-ups
- 3) Hosted community meetings to develop the Community Vision Plan for Royal Lake
- 4) Royal Lake trail repair

There are so many talented and passionate people in our community, and FORL would definitely benefit from an infusion of new ideas and new expertise; specifically, we are looking for a few enthusiastic volunteers to take on specific tasks, such as:

- Communications: We would like to have a quarterly FORL newsletter, and perhaps create a FORL Facebook page
- Liaison to the schools, scouting organizations, and representatives from the neighboring communities to broaden our message and reach
- Point of contact for the park recreational equipment

At the meeting on October 24th, we will discuss, among other things, a spreadsheet we have developed of priority maintenance and capital improvement projects we would like FCPA to undertake, with our community support, and the names of all the parks that surround Royal Lake and an FCPA proposal to simplify the nomenclature. (Wait, what? You didn't know there are FOUR different parks around Royal Lake? Come to the meeting to learn more...)

Instructions for Using PayPal

- 1. Go to the http://www.kpwca.org website.
- 2. Near the center of the page at the bottom of the box, click on the link beside Option 2: "Google Form KPWCA Membership" to complete the form online. Proceed to item 5, below.
- 3. If you prefer to use a paper form, click "KPWCA Membership Form and Paypal Instructions" and right-click the form to save a blank copy to your local drive. Then, open it from the saved location, type in your information and save it again or print it out. Make sure your data is visible after saving or printing. The saved version with your data can be emailed to membership@kpwca.org. Or the paper form, once completed electronically or legibly by hand, can be given to your Block Captain. (Option 2 is much more streamlined.)
- 4. Decide what additional amounts, if any, you want to contribute in addition to the Membership Fee. Make a note of the number next to that organization or activity in the chart (1-11).
- 5. Click on the "Donate" button.
- 6. Enter in the **TOTAL** amount of your Donation: \$20 Membership + any additional.
- 7. If you have a PayPal account, log in.
- 8. If you don't have a PayPal account, that's ok, you don't need one! Simply click on the "Continue" button on the bottom left under "Don't have a PayPal Account?" Then enter your billing and credit card information. (You can be sure the transaction is secure if you see "https" near the beginning of the web address at the top of your browser window.)
- 9. Click Continue.
- 10. At the next screen, you will be asked to review your donation.
- 11. If you used the Google form, skip to step 13. Otherwise, under "Kings Park West Civic Association Membership", click on the little pencil icon or "Additional Contributions" if you are making optional contributions in addition to the \$20 membership fee. A drop down box will open up.
- 12. Refer back to the membership form and use the number in front of the organization or activity in the chart (1-11) to type into that box how your contributions above the \$20 are to be used.
 - For example, if you want to donate \$25 to the Volunteer Fire Department, you would enter 1-\$25. For a \$30 contribution to Parks and Lakes, you would enter 10-\$30, and so on.
- 13. Once that is completed, click "Donate Now" and you're done with your payment!

If you don't use the on-line Google form, it's imperative that you provide us a paper copy of the form. Double-check to make sure "PAYPAL" is checked, the total dollar amount is entered and the date paid is clearly indicated at the top of the form. 


Figure 4. (A) Bloodroot (Sanguinaria canadensis), (B) fringed or wild bleeding hearts (Dicentra eximia), and (C) heartleaf foamflower (Tiarella cordifolia); Jacob's ladder in the distance.




Figure 5. (A) Twinleaf (*Jeffersonia diphylla*), (B) golden ragwort (*Packera aurea*, previously *Senecio aureus*), and (C) pussytoes (*Antennaria plantaginifolia*).

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THE GARDEN CORNER

For this article, I wanted to provide an update on my experiment growing potatoes in fabric growbags. I bought six black, fabric growbags online that I could use for this project, but I decided to dedicate two of the bags to growing sweet potatoes. The sweet potatoes are still awaiting harvest. For the regular spuds, that left me with four growbags. Before planting, it was important to decide where to place the growbags so that they could benefit from at least eight hours of sunlight. In the spring, I had cut down a large beech tree in my backyard that was providing too much shade on my fruit trees and needed to be removed. The tree trunk was cut to ground level, but not completely removed. I decided to set the four growbags on the trunk.

I did not know which variety of potatoes would grow well in Kings Park West, but I surmised that a longer-growing variety would work best. There are two general types of potato varieties – determinate and indeterminate. Determinate potatoes are rather bushy in nature, and are restricted to a certain height. For many of the earlier potato varieties, foliage growth significantly slows or comes to a halt when flowers bloom, giving them a predetermined height. They tend to produce potatoes only at the initial planting level in the soil. These varieties are ideal for new potatoes, which isn't exactly what you're looking for in an indeterminate or long season variety.

When you think of indeterminate potatoes, it is quite the opposite! Indeterminate potatoes will continue to grow throughout the season. Some people believe that indeterminate varieties grow better in containers, since you can cover the plants with soil as they grow taller. New potatoes are produced along the covered part of the stem at each stem nodule. I chose the German Butterball variety, and ordered a pound of seed potatoes from the Maine Potato Lady. They arrived in April and I planted them around May 1st.

The German Butterball is a light brown-skinned, oval-shaped potato that has a very buttery-tasting interior. German Butterballs are a late-season variety, so they were ready to harvest in late August.

For my soil, I used a mixture of potting soil, composted cow manure, blood meal, bone meal, peat moss, azomite, and Epson salts. I placed approx. six inches of the soil mixture in the growbags, and then laid the seed potatoes on top of the soil about four to six inches apart. Next, I covered them with four inches of soil. I watered the plants as often as needed to keep them damp.

After about three weeks, the plants were about six-inches tall; I covered them with more soil and continued this process until the growbags were filled to about two inches from the top. Then I placed a two-inch layer of dried-grass mulch on top of the soil. Now, I only needed to keep the soil damp until the potatoes were ready to harvest.

The potato plants grew vigorously and were a dark, healthy green color. However, I noticed an odd occurrence: the plants never produced blooms. I am told that after the potato plants bloom, they begin to slowly die and are ready to harvest after about a third of the plant has died.

Life interfered with my potato harvest, since we made a trip to Italy in August and did not return until mid-September. I decided to harvest the spuds on September 22nd.

I dumped each growbag into a wheel barrow and searched the soil for potatoes. The largest potato I found was about three-inches in diameter, but most were much smaller. The four bags produced perhaps a gallon of potatoes. So, my experiment at growing potatoes in growbags was, in effect, a virtual failure.

But on the bright side, I still have lots of fuzzy and hardy kiwis that have not been taken by those pesky chipmunks and squirrels. Life is good!

By the way, I still have a pair of hardy kiwi plants and a goji berry plant looking for a home. They are free to the first requestor – ping me at thefairfaxgardencorner@gmail.com.













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
