#### THE GARDEN CORNER

Late Autom has arrived and the urban gardener must turn his/her attention from growing your favorite plants to preparing the soil for winter. This article will explore some activities that need to be completed to make our gardens more "green." Such projects are making a comeback with the organic gardening movement.

If you had an active garden during the spring and summer, your soil may be depleted of much of its nutrients and, since the soil in much of Virginia has a high clay content, it can benefit from adding organic matter. Additionally, during the winter when there are no plants and their roots to protect the soil, adding compost on top of the soil will provide protection from erosion and depletion of nutrients. This will also attract those beneficial organisms such as earthworms and when it decomposes will add needed nutrients to the garden soil. A gardener can purchase organic compost, or compost plus manure that will improve your soil, but it is much more enjoyable, frugal and green to make your own compost.

There are many ways to make your own compost pile, bin, or container; but in an urban environment, we are often concerned with making the compost bin esthetic. You can purchase a compost bin on line, or at a local garden supply store that will be esthetically acceptable. I have been composting our kitchen scraps, mixed with shredded leaves that I saved from last fall and I now have a good compost tumbler full of beautiful compost. However, that will not be enough; so, I have two wire cages that I made that contain some beautiful leaf mold that I can use. Leaf mold takes longer to produce than compost, since it contains less nitrogen and does not heat up.

This year as the fall leaves begin to drop, plan on making your own leaf mold. Here is the way I do it. First, using chicken wire, or any other kind of wire that does not have holes larger than three-inches in diameter and is about 4 feet wide, roll out and cut a section of wire that will be 10 feet long and 4 feet wide. Form the wire into a cylinder, tying the ends together. You can use wire, but I prefer to use quick ties to allow easy opening when you harvest the leaf mold.

When my lawn is covered with leaves, I get out my trusty lawnmower and place the leaf catcher bag on it. I mow the leaves and a bit of grass and fill the bag up. Then I dump the leaf-grass mixture into my wire enclosure. After each bag is dumped, I push it down to remove as much air as possible. You should know that this 4-feet-tall pile of leaves will shrink down to about a 1-foot-tall pile by spring.

In addition to spreading the compost and leaf mold on my now dormant garden soil, I like to spread a 1-inch layer of composted cow manure on top of it. Now your soil is ready for the winter.

During the fall and early winter, I also like to employ another composting method called the direct dig, dump and cover method. During the winter when my compost bin is not working efficiently due to the temperature, I dig trenches in my garden, dump in my kitchen scraps and covered them up. It helps avoid attracting animals by sprinkling a little lime on top of the kitchen scraps before you cover them. I only continue this process until about January 15. This allows the scraps to compost for about3 months. This is plenty of time before spring planting. When you turned over the ground during the spring, the soil will be dark and rich.

Don't forget – Fall is the best time to plant your garlic! Here is the way I do it. Decide on what type of garlic you want to grow. I grow hard-neck garlic and I plant whatever variety that I can find. I till my garden plot well, smooth out the tilled soil. My plot is four feet by eight feet and I plant four rows with about 5 inches between plants. I select the largest cloves to plant and save the smaller ones for eating.

Using a broom handle I make holes in the soil about 4-6 inches deep and drop a clove of garlic in each hole with the pointed end up. I collapse the soil around the holes and water. I also cover the bed with about two inches of compost, leaves, or straw.

Now sit back and wait until late June of early July to harvest your garlic. I can wait until spring!

### Parks & Lake Update

The KPW Road Raiders kicked off the new cleanup season on Sept 14th at Monticello Park. A small group of volunteers cleared 5 large trash bags of garbage from the park and its neighboring woods, preventing it from further contaminating our parks and streams. I think it's safe to say, we accomplished a lot in 30 minutes and would love to see more community members participating.

Our next Road Raiders event will be held on October 14th from 9-11a.m. on the Shane's Creek trail. There have been some complaints about the overgrown trail and trash near Roberts and on the south side of the creek. Our goal is to cut back the overgrowth and clean up the trash, but we cannot

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do this without YOU! We need volunteers to support our plans! And don't forget, the time provided can count as volunteer service hours.

#### What Impact Will Fed Interest Rate Cut Have on Kings Park West Real Estate?

On September 18, 2024, the Federal Reserve revealed a half-point interest rate cut, marking the first reduction in four years. This move indicates that inflation might be coming under control. 
