



THE GARDEN CORNER

In a previous article, published in February 2024, I mentioned that I had begun a new gardening project, Growing Artichokes in Kings Park West. I was encouraged by the fact that Thomas Jefferson grew artichokes at Monticello in Northern Virginia and brought artichoke seeds to Virginia from France and Italy. He may have planted his seeds directly into the soil, but he may have germinated them earlier in an ancient greenhouse. I used more modern methods that loosely followed Jefferson's gardening methods.



I bought my globe artichoke seeds online and planted the seeds in an indoor greenhouse in small plastic cups, Then I transplanted then around March 1 in my edible gardening landscape.

As I mentioned previously, artichokes require about 120 hous of vernalization (exposure to temperatures from about 38 degrees to about 50 degrees) in order to produce flowers, which are the edible part of the artichoke. After transplant, I covered the plants with pots to protect them from frost, when needed.



Apparently, my artichoke plants did not receive adequate vernalization, because they did not flower this year. Shown in this photo are my artichoke plants after winterization.

Winterization is my effort this fall to try to overwinter the artichoke plants such that they are exposed to adequate chill hours to allow them to flower next year, while protecting them









from freezes. process This consists of the following: 1) After the first frost dav (October 15) prune the plants back to about 4 inches high. 2) Cover the plants with about six inches of mulch. I used shredded limb mulch that I



got free from the Fairfax County Transfer Center.

Here is a photo of one of my artichoke plants that shows that the plant has continued growing after it was winterized. I am unsure that these plants will make it through the winter; but if they do, we should harvest some great artichokes. Perhaps my chances could be improved if I covered the plants with some kind of pot or row cover. What do you think?

This fall I have started an additional project. Many of you know that for a few years I have grown an asparagus patch. Unfortunately, because of the fact that I did not weed it often enough, the patch has been invaded by Bermuda grass and asparagus does not compete well with such grass. Bermuda



is extremely hard to remove and control. So, my project is to remove the all plants and grass from the bed and rebuild it for something else. This photo shows the before picture of the asparagus bed and the picture of the initial stage of the rework. Happy gardening!

Friends of Royal Lake Community Meeting Offers Details for Royal Lake Parks' Trail Improvements

On October 30, 2024, Friends of Royal Lake (FORL) held a community-wide meeting to discuss the trail and park improvements funded by the \$1.35 million American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) and developer proffer money. The Fairfax County Park Authority trail project managers Tom McFarland and Beth lannetta presented the status of the projects with projected timelines for completion. A copy of their presentation with some

detailed drawings is on the FORL website.



The projects are:

- Trail connecting Commonwealth Blvd to Royal Lake Circuit Trail. This project will establish an 1800 foot by 6-footwide paved trail from the Royal Lake Circuit Trail to Commonwealth Blvd. The Commonwealth entrance will be near DeQuincey Drive.
- Rabbit Branch
 Bridge to be replaced. The current bridge, while safe,

is nearing the end of its useful life. The new bridge will be a 45-foot x 8-foot fiberglass bridge. (See photo of sample bridge).

- Richardson Drive entrance to ball fields to be raised at the bridge crossing and repaved and expanded to include paving of the trail to the field near the soccer equipment shed
- Lakepointe Community entrance from the top of the dam to the Circuit Trail to be paved with approximately 200 feet of 6-feet wide asphalt.
- Lakeside shade structure 20 x 30 feet to be installed over the picnic area at Lakeside Park, funded by developer proffer money. The picnic area project will include a shade

structure, a concrete pad and three large 8-foot picnic tables. The shade structure will have a fabric covering that will be removed in the winter but will be up during the rest of the year.



The status of the projects is:

- All projects have substantially completed design.
- National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) documentation is required for all projects funded by ARPA. Documentation is in progress. The Lakeside shade structure does not require NEPA documentation since it is funded by another source.
- The project managers anticipate completion of NEPA and building permit approvals by the summer of 2025 with construction to follow for Richardson, Lakepointe, Shade Structure and Bridge replacement projects.
- A Minor Site Plan will be required for the trail connecting Commonwealth Blvd to Royal Lake Circuit Trail. The Site Plan was submitted for review to county Land Development Services in September 2024. Approval is anticipated late Fall 2025.
- FORL will provide updates as they are available. Please see the friendsofroyallake.org website or email friendsofroyallake@gmail.com for updated information.

Royal Lake Park recently received a wonderful facelift thanks to the hard work of a local Scout who focused his Eagle Scout project on renovating the park's picnic area. This project, led by Josiah Park of Troop 918 at the request of Mr. Tom McCook, involved the restoration of four picnic tables and the thorough cleaning of two BBQ grills, making the popular gathering spot more welcoming for families and park visitors.





Over the course of two weekends, a team of volunteers worked diligently to restore the picnic tables, which had weathered years of exposure to the elements. They replaced damaged wooden slats and bolts on the tables. More than 50 years later, Fairfax Little League players can still be seen practicing and playing games at The Spiegler - Cox Ballfield at Lakeside Park, enjoying the view of Royal Lake while making lifelong friends and memories on the diamond. In its inaugural season this fall, Fairfax Little League Softball joined this community tradition as players enjoyed weeknight practices overlooking Royal Lake.

Until now, no Little League Softball program existed to serve residents of Kings Park West, or anyone else within Fairfax Little League boundaries. The successful launch of Little League Softball has filled this need, making Fairfax Little League's programs more inclusive and accessible to the children of our community. Fairfax Little League is partnering with Annandale-North Springfield Little League to offer Little League Softball for girls ages 7-12 (born January 1, 2017 – December 31, 2012) who live or go to school within the boundaries of Fairfax Little League or Annandale-North Springfield Little League.

Following a successful first season consisting of 56 players and 5 teams, Fairfax Little League will be expanding for the Spring 2025 season by offering three levels of play: Minors (AA & AAA) for girls ages 7-11 as well as Majors for ages 10-12. It is our hope that the Fairfax Little League Softball program will continue to grow in the coming years to include other levels of play in the same way our baseball programs have grown over the past 68 years.

What's Next For the Housing Market?

On November 8, just days after the presidential election, National Association of REALTORS® (NAR) economists weighed in on home sales and mortgage rates—and how the election results, the economy and other factors could impact the real estate business in the year ahead. Regarding the election, Lawrence Yun, chief economist of the NAR, stated, "We've seen after presidential elections—and it doesn't matter who wins—that there's usually a slight boost in home sales. It removes some uncertainty."

Here's an overview of the NAR's predictions on key housing indicators for the year ahead.

Home Sales (Number of Homes Sold) to Rise

The housing market in recent years has faced challenges due to a housing shortage and increasing mortgages rates. Citing a continuing improving job market, and some recovery of the housing inventory shortage, Yun suggested that "maybe the worst is over."

Here's Yun's forecast for the next two years:

- 2025 sales projection: Existing home sales to rise 9% year-over-year; new home sales to jump by 11%.
- 2026 sales projection: Existing-home sales to rise 13% year-over-year; new home sales to increase by 8%.

Mortgage Rates to Moderate

According to Freddie Mac, the average 30-year fixed-rate mortgage has ranged from 6.08% to 7.44% over the past 52 weeks. Yun says the rates should stabilize at the low end of that range for 2025 and 2026. Potential buyers anticipating drastically lower rates should be cautioned that this is unlikely, mainly due to the substantial national budget deficit, which limits the availability of mortgage funds as the United States borrows large amounts to manage its debt.

Home Price Appreciation Will Slow

While homeowners have enjoyed record-breaking equity gains, home buyers have been struggling with affordability. A typical homeowner has accumulated \$147,000 in housing wealth just over the last five years, according to NAR's research. "The strong price increases cannot be sustainable for another five years, or America will be divided ... with only a few getting to experience the tremendous housing wealth," Yun said. "If we bring more supply to the housing market, home price increases will not be as outrageous ... and will be more in line with wages."

Kings Park West Neighbor Assist:

- Be prepared for the winter weather. The task of keeping sidewalks and driveways clear of snow and ice can be a good source of exercise. However, it could also overstress those not prepared for the tasks.

- We do have a number of older KPW residents who are willing to pay for snow removal. And we have some teens and others who could make some spending money by offering to work.
- To help connect those who need help and those who want to make some money, KPW Neighbor Assist is collecting names of workers and residents willing to pay for the snow removal service. We will try to link the two based on location.



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
